COVID Updates

On January 11, Governor Waltz announced the launch of the next phase of the ‘Kids Deserve a Shot’ vaccine incentive program. To encourage Minnesota families to get their kids 5- to 11-years-old fully vaccinated against COVID-19. Minnesota families who get their 5- to 11-year-old fully vaccinated in January and February can get a \$200 Visa gift card.

Later this spring, there will be drawings for five \$100,000 Minnesota college scholarship drawings for all Minnesotans 5-11 years old who are fully vaccinated. Details on the drawing will be announced in the coming months.

Testing: Fisher School still has several free Vault saliva tests available. Upon request, they can be taken home and administered via Zoom with Vault. The Vault saliva tests are a PCR test that get results within 48 hours of them receiving it. Fisher School is in the process of getting approved to provide CUE nasal swab rapid antigen testing. These tests will provide results in about 20 minutes. Students would have to have parental consent before they could be tested.
